Terms and Conditions

By entering this competition you are accepting the following:

1. Introduction

British Art in Motion is organised by the Paul Mellon Centre for Studies in British Art (“the Organisers”)

These Terms and Conditions, together with any specific guidelines or rules notified by the Organisers as relevant to British Art in Motion, apply to entrants (“you”) submitting their work for entry to British Art in Motion. By entering British Art in Motion you agree to be bound by these Terms and Conditions and you acknowledge that your personal information will be used in accordance with the Privacy Policy of the Organisers (see further section 6 below, ‘GDPR & your personal information’).

The Organisers reserve the right to cancel or amend British Art in Motion or these Terms and Conditions and related guidelines, submission deadlines, or judging criteria, at any time and without prior notice. Any such changes will be posted on the Paul Mellon Centre’s website.

2. British Art in Motion rules

British Art in Motion is only open to undergraduate students who are currently enrolled at a UK-based university.

Your entry will be disqualified if:

- Your details are found to be untrue. By submitting your entry, you are confirming that your names, date of birth, address and university name are true;
- Your entry does not contain a reference from a university tutor verifying that your application materials were made by you;
- Your entry is found to be plagiarised or contain any plagiarised material; or
- Your entry contains any unlawful (for example, defamatory or obscene) material.

3. Awarding process

Monetary prizes will be awarded to winners either at or after the awards ceremony. Winning films may be published after the awards ceremony at an appropriate date.

All decisions made by the British Art in Motion judges, including the selection of winning entries, are final. Unfortunately, we will not be able to provide feedback for unsuccessful entries.

Unsuccessful entrants, including those who made the shortlist but did not win, are encouraged to enter again.

4. Copyright permissions for winning entries

By submitting entries, you hereby grant to each of the Organisers a non-exclusive, royalty-free, irrevocable copyright licence to reproduce your film / work for the purposes of evaluating your entry. Such copyright licence shall include the right for the Organisers to store, distribute, transmit, communicate, and adapt the work in accordance with the applicable copyright law.

As part of the prize, winners of British Art in Motion will have their work published on the Paul Mellon Centre websites and social media channels. In order to publish the winning entries, written copyright permission will be required from each winner in advance.

Copyright permission can be granted by the entrant, if aged 18 years and over. If the entrant is aged under 18 years, copyright permission must be given by a responsible adult. A responsible adult for these purposes is defined as a parent/carer, teacher, social worker, counsellor, or youth worker. If the individual is aged 18 and over, but unable to communicate their own consent, agreement will be sought via a responsible adult.

If copyright permission is not granted, the Organisers will not publish the film in question.

You will be credited in all reproductions of your work.

5. Filming and Photography

In the event of any filming or photography by the Paul Mellon Centre at a British Art in Motion event, the permission of the attendees will be sought in advance. All attendees will be asked to sign a Model Release.

This can be signed by the individual, if aged 18 years and over. If the individual is aged under 18 years, the release must be signed by a responsible adult. If the individual is aged 18 and over, but unable to communicate their own consent, agreement will be sought via their responsible adult.

If permission is not granted the Paul Mellon Centre will endeavour not to capture the individual in question on film or in photographs of the event.

The Organisers will not publish the name or identifying details of a child, young person or vulnerable adult alongside their image. This excludes winning candidates, whose image, name and/or school may be used during the promotion of the prize-winning entries.

If permission is not granted by a winning candidate, the Organisers will endeavour not to document the involvement of the individual in question.

6. GDPR & your personal information

The Organisers are committed to protecting your privacy and will use all personal data supplied by you in connection with your entry in compliance with the General Data Protection Regulation (EU) 2016/679 (GDPR) and the Data Protection Act 2018. All personal data will be held securely and solely used for the purpose of administering submissions for the British Art in Motion Film competition. Details of your name, university, and film will be shared with the members of the judging panel. If your entry is successful they may also be published on the Paul Mellon Centre's website, social media channels and in print for public mission purposes.

At the end of each round of British Art in Motion, core information including any relevant film or photographic material on all of the entrants will be retained permanently for historical research and evaluation purposes in the Paul Mellon Centre Institutional Archives.

7. General

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Organisers exclude their liability for any direct or indirect damages or losses of any kind arising out of anyone's participation in British Art in Motion, including any entrant's use of any of the monetary prizes.

If any provision of these Terms and Conditions is found to be invalid by any court having competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of that provision will not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of these terms, which shall remain in full force and effect.

British Art in Motion, these Terms and Conditions and any non-contractual obligations connected to them shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law and the English courts shall have jurisdiction to resolve any issue under these Terms and Conditions.
